

The meeting started at 7.15pm

#### Matters requiring a decision

S.22/2235/HHOLD. Washbrook Mill, Edge Road.

Replacement of existing garage.

The Committee agreed to object to this application as it did not comply with policy HC6 of Stroud District Council's Local Plan.

The Committee agreed to support the following applications:

- a. S.22/1735/HHOLD. Skippets Cottage, Damsells Mill Lane. Replacing existing conservatory with single storey extension and second floor rear extension.
- b. S.22/2303/FUL and S.22/2304/LBC. Holcombe Farm. Alterations, including demolition of modern elements and extensions to an existing barn at Holcombe Farm and its conversion to residential use with associated works.
- c. S.22/2392/HHOLD. Wellgrove, Paradise. Removal of garage & construction of new extension.
- d. S.22/2389/HHOLD & S.22/2390/ LBC. Dovecot Cottage Stepping Stone Lane. Demolition of existing conservatory and construction of new extension.

#### PARISH COUNCIL

Members present: Cllrs Martin Slinger (Chairman), Adrian Gyde, Ann Daniels, James Cross, Ian Massey, Rosie Nash, Roey Parker, Rob Lewis, Philip Taylor, Abigail Smith. Apology. Cllr Andy Cash. County Cllr Sue Williams and District Cllr Julie Job had also forwarded their apologies.

Presentation. Prior to the start of the meeting, Mr Alan Fielder representing Pam Bailey, who now lives in Northampton, presented the Parish Council with two paintings of Painswick which Mrs Bailey

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wished to give to the Council (see p11).

#### **Public Questions**

Mr David Allott of Stamages Lane, raised various traffic issues of concern which he had taken to the County Council. He expressed his worry about the diversions which had created difficulties for motorists as a result of work being carried out by Severn Trent (see report p6). He also raised the matter of the continuing temporary traffic lights on the A46 at Broadham and the dangerous situation following the felling of the trees alongside the main road. He said that he could not understand the delay in the County Council putting forward a solution.

#### **Co-option**

The Council unanimously agreed to co-opt Sandra Hunkin for the Sheepscombe Ward vacancy following the circulation of the candidate's details to members prior to the meeting.

#### Reports

County Council. Cllr Sue Williams had circulated a County Council report to members prior to the meeting. The full report can be accessed through the Parish Council website. It includes items on the use of recycling centres, on a cost of living support hub, on cycle lane barriers and on fostering children, amongst other things. District Council. Cllr Julie Job had advised the Clerk that EV Charging Points for all of the District Council-owned Market Town car parks had been agreed by the District Council and that the roll out will be completed within the next two years.

Chairman. Cllr Slinger reported on the 11th of November Remembrance Service at the War Memorial which he had attended and read an extract from the Holy Bible. The service was celebrated by the Reverend Andrew Leach. The names of the fallen during the World Wars were read by a member of the military. Wreaths were laid by the Chairman on behalf of the Parish Council, the Reverend Leach, children from The Croft School and other local representatives. He said that he wished on behalf of the Parish Council to remember the fallen in both World Wars

from the other villages in the parish, viz., Slad, Edge and Sheepscombe. Cllr Slinger also said he would be holding a meeting with The Croft School headteacher to arrange the agenda for a meeting between the Parish Council and the schoolchildren. Meetings had not been held recently mainly because of Covid.

#### The Parish Council's concerns relating to Short Term Lettings in the Parish

Cllr Lewis introduced the item and advised the Members that the Parish Council's resolution to the Association of Parish & Town Councils expressing their concern had been agreed at their AGM on 15th July. Cllr Lewis said that there were currently 45 properties in and around Painswick registered for Airbnb/Short Term Lettings. "The Council agreed to ask the District Council what records they might have for Long and Short Term Private rentals in and around Painswick specifically, and if they would be interested in immediate local registration and licensing along the lines of Alcohol and Taxi Licensing. Revenue for this could be raised in the form of payments and levies in Council Tax on such properties."

#### Friendship Agreement between **Slavutych and Painswick**

The Chairman reported that a Zoom meeting had taken place between the two towns on the 4th of November during which the agreement was signed. The Council agreed to the appointment of Cllr Philip Taylor as Lead Councillor.

#### Traffic Committee recommendation

The Council approved the recommendation of the Traffic Committee to accept the offer of an ANPR Camera from Gloucestershire County Council and to purchase two further cameras at a cost of £500 each plus an annual licensing fee of £100 per

#### **Boundary Commission Review**

The Boundary Commission is currently in its final phase of consultation on revised proposals for changes to Parliamentary constituencies. For Painswick, the proposal remains that we will go into a new North Cotswolds constituency that stretches up to Chipping Campden, but also includes Minchinhampton, Upton, Brockworth, Churchdown and Hardwicke. Responses to the consultation may be made at www. bcereviews.org.uk, but must be made by Monday 5th December. The Commission's final report is expected to be published by 1st July 2023 and to come into effect for the next General Election after that.

# Gunpowder, treason and plot

On Wednesday 2nd November 2022, just in time for Guy Fawkes night, Dr Tim Brain addressed the Club on the Gunpowder Plot. After a career in policing, Tim

knows a thing or two about criminal conspiracy and terrorist activities. With this knowledge and his enthusiasm for historical research, he delivered a superb summary of the inspiration for the plot, how it was planned, and why, mercifully, it failed.

Robert Catesby (1573–1605) was the leader behind the plot and recruited a team of 5 plotters initially. Their main aim was to blow up the House of Lords at the State Opening of Parliament, killing King James, the monarch's nearest relatives, influential members of the Privy Council, the senior judges of the English legal system, most of the Protestant aristocracy, the bishops of the Church of England, and all members of the House of Lords and Parliament, in one fell swoop. Once the King and his Parliament were dead, the plotters intended to install Elizabeth on the English throne as a titular Queen and re-establish Catholicism in England.

Guy Fawkes, an Army engineer with experience of blowing up castles, was recruited to lay the charges and light the fuse. But one conspirator was concerned for the safety of a friend and sent an anonymous letter urging him not to attend. The letter was shown to the King, who ordered a search of the building for anything suspicious. Fawkes who was guarding the explosives, was arrested, tortured, interrogated and, along with many of his associates, executed. Catesby was killed while resisting arrest.

#### Without comment

The Beacon has continued to press the County Council for an update on progress at Broadham where temporary traffic lights have now been in place for over 9 months. The response this month says there is no update, but adds 'This is a difficult site as there is no verge for us to be able to install a standard crash barrier and hence it needs thinking about. The other complication is that there is a small retaining wall that we need to take into account.'

#### Waste hot, want not

The answers to two puzzling questions were revealed at the October meeting of Yew Trees WI. What happens to our rubbish once our bins have been emptied? And what goes on in that strange construction at Javelin Park? With the aid of powerpoint and video, Diane Greene from The Gloucestershire Energy from Waste Facility goes a compare benefity and the base of the state of the state



Facility gave a comprehensive answer to both these questions.

The Stroud District waste lorries go straight to the Waste Facility which uses state of the art technology to safely and efficiently combust up to 190,000 tonnes per year of residual waste which cannot be recycled or composted. It keeps over 90% of the county's residual waste out of landfill. After burning, the magnetic and the non-magnetic metals are separated out and sent for recycling. The ash is turned into aggregate for road building and the gases going up the chimney are treated before going out into the atmosphere. The residues from these treatments are the only things that are not recycled, they have to be disposed of. The facility generates the equivalent electricity to power 25,000 homes, it employs around 40 people and includes a visitor centre and education suite.

On Tuesday 20th December we are looking forward to welcoming Julia Marusich, one of Painswick's Ukranian guests, who will talk about Ukraine and her work as a visitor guide at the Chernobyl nuclear power station. Some festive wine and nibbles will also be enjoyed. Ladies, do join us for what should be a fascinating evening: 7.30 pm in the Church Rooms.

#### The story of a Cad



The glorious woods at Sheepscombe, now owned by the National Trust, were once part of the estate of Ebworth House, demolished in the 1970s after decades of neglect. In its heyday though, it was a grand mansion, with many stories to tell of its occupants. And there's nobody better to tell them than Elizabeth Skinner, whose knowledge

of Sheepscombe local history is second to none.

At the Painswick Local History Society meeting in November she had a particularly lively and entertaining story to tell of one previous owner, Stephen Welch, who inherited the estate in 1812 from a slaveowning grandfather with a sugar plantation in Barbados, which he also named Ebworth – a name still used there today. The grandson seems at least not to have been a slave-owner, but he was nevertheless, as Elizabeth's story amply demonstrated, a bit of a cad, mirroring in real life some of the attitudes and actions of Mr. Wickham in 'Pride



and Prejudice'. While he was living the life of a rake, much of the time in France, his wealthy wife was left at Ebworth, where she and her sister experimented with various radical ideas - but that's another story.

There is no Local History Society meeting in December, so the next meeting will be on 17th January, when Stuart Butler will talk on 'The radical history of Stroud'. New members are welcome, as are non-members on payment of a small fee.

#### Seascapes and duets

This month demonstrated the rewards of PMAG - discovering great new music, and how well-known pieces can sound fresh and exciting with virtuoso artists. On 3rd November Howard Allen presented Orchestral Seascapes,



great music with engaging and enthusiastic commentary. First, Mendelssohn's Hebridean overture, well known as Fingal's Cave, inspired by his visit there with its remarkable basalt columns and unusual acoustics. An inspiring piece, the sound of the sea surging powerfully to and fro. Debussy's La Mer, by contrast, evoked a quiet sea. Then the opening of Vaughan Williams' Sea Symphony - its power and majesty can only be described as thrilling. Two Sea Interludes from Britten's Peter Grimes conveyed the brooding atmosphere of the story. Lastly, and gentler, two of Elgar's lovely Sea Pictures.

On 17th November Mike Kerton presented well loved opera duets. Such intensity of emotion! Composers included Mozart, Puccini, Saint-Saëns, and Verdi - particular highlights were Mussorgsky's Boris Godunov, with the most fantastic climax, in Russian, and a soaring orchestral accompaniment. Then an even more intense aria, from Giordano's Andrea Chénier, which was completely stunning.

Two meetings in December, 1st at 2:30 Dennis Morgan presents The call of Rome - a video of early choral music, with commentary, sung by The Sixteen, with a full performance of Allegri's Misereri. To follow, the Berlin Philharmonic under Simon Rattle play Borodin including his 2nd symphony. On December 15th at 2:30 our Christmas social, short AGM, Quiz, and Christmas buffet tea (extra cost). 
#### **Painswick Educational Foundation**

The roots of the Painswick Educational Foundation (known as the Trust) can be traced back to 3rd April 1707, when a certain Giles Smith signed a settlement to finance the education of 10 boys at the Painswick Free (or Endowed) School. The Trust has since evolved through the twists and turns of amalgamations as well as purchases and sales of assets, and focused on different skills from time to time (such as typewriting and carpentry skills), to become the Painswick-centric charity it is today. In its previous incarnations, the Trust's assets have included a farm with 13 acres at Haresfield, a school site and buildings in Painswick (the first floor and offices on the ground floor of the Town Hall) and a hotel (presumed to be St Michael's Cottage and the Cotswold Private Hotel). Sadly, no such assets exist in today's portfolio. A modest amount is available from dividends and the Trustees meet twice a year to review and approve applications.

Trustees welcome applications from children and young people (including those at university) in the Parish of Painswick (which includes Edge, Slad and Sheepscombe) for grants to assist with educational support, such as educational and IT equipment, books, course fees and apprenticeships. Recently, there have been an overwhelming number of applications, some seeking amounts that are too great for the Trust to support but the Trustees aim to contribute to the extent possible. Perhaps this demand is a reflection of the current climate and also the increasing resources now required to facilitate education. The Trustees would like to be in a position to fulfil all qualifying applications received. In order to do that, the Trust requires an influx of money; any contribution towards the fund would be most appreciated so that the Trust's work may continue.

The Trust's governing document is the same one ratified on 29th July 1932 and its general aim has never drastically changed: since its inception hundreds of years ago, it has sponsored the furtherance of the education (and therefore future chances) of the children and young people of Painswick. The Trustees are keen that it continues to support Painswick in this way and will continue to use available funds to do so in the future. The Painswick Educational Foundation is registered charity number 311771. As well as a mother of three, I am a midwife and antenatal teacher, so uniquely experienced and knowledgeable about pregnancy and birth in all settings. #### **Bird Migration**

July saw the start of the swift return migration this year, with the bulk of the numbers in the last week. Fifteen and a half thousand birds were logged during the month. A few swifts appeared in August and ten more in early September. August was fairly quiet but a few spotted flycatchers, crossbills, wheatears and hobbies passed through and in the trees and scrubby areas willow warblers, chiffchaffs, blackcaps and whitethroats were seen. September had an early hawfinch, a great white egret and a build up in meadow pipit numbers, the first redwing, a late swift and a strong passage of house martins and swallows..

October was a very busy month. The first two weeks had a merlin, stonechat, rock pipits, meadow pipits, wagtails and various finches. Bramblings started to be seen in the chaffinch flocks and a red kite, peregrine and more wheatears occurred. The last half of the month saw heavy passage of birds with redwing, fieldfare, crossbill, hawfinch, chaffinch, skylark, meadow pipit, ring ouzel and eight late swallows. On one day over fourteen thousand birds were counted.

November so far has seen wood pigeons, redwings and fieldfares continue to pass through, often in large flocks, with occasional hawfinches to add to the quality. Painswick Beacon area is on an important migration route through England and counts will continue.

#### **Jottings**

Around this area most of the soils are what we call light soils. On the higher land, the topsoil is 2'' - 3''deep and down in the valley bottom, 6"+. The soils can be alkaline, neutral or acid. Soil with a pH of less than 7.5 is acid and above is said to be neutral going on the alkaline (this is better in most cases around here).

One teaspoon of healthy top soil contains about one billion microscopic cells with around 10,000 different species. There can be 3 million earth worms per acre. They aerate the soil as they burrow through eating waste matter, especially detritus and manure. This speeds up the decomposition of organic material. They excrete waste matter which adds matter to the soil and food to other species. The burrows are used by crop roots to reach moisture and nutrients such as nitrogen and sulphur. So, the more worms, the richer the soil.

Slugs and snails do the same, although they are more of a pest in gardens. All three are food for a lot of our wildlife including birds, frogs and toads, etc. Dung beetles feed on faeces. They thrive on the cowpats from stock that do not get antibiotics and other additives, because the faeces are more solid with air spaces in which the larvae can breathe, live and grow. You need organic matter and animal muck to feed the soil.

Then there are the roots of plants that live in the top soil and deep rooted plants that live in the sub soil as well. All this and more to keep the soil aerated. You can upset this by having too much water in the soil or by compaction caused by people, footpaths, vehicles and farm machinery going over the same spot. This stops root growth and aerating the soil etc. Then in the worst cases the roots go down through the top soil, but the sub soil being so hard the roots go sideways. There are the very deep rooted plants like docks, some forms of thistle etc whose roots can go down metres. Because of this, they are able to survive in a drought time. Then there are trees roots keeping the soil texture open. We can blame them for taking the moisture out of the soil, but in fact they slow down the movement of rain water downhill into streams and rivers, keeping a more even flow down the banks and fields.

#### **Property Report**

The shock delivered to the housing market in September and October is gradually fading and mortgage rates have come back down a little. Properties are still coming to the market and are still selling, even if mortgages are a bit harder to get.

St. Mary's Cottage in Victoria Street, right in the heart of the village, came onto the market (Murrays, £600,000) but is already under offer. Flat 6, a first floor two bedroom apartment at Hyett Orchard, is available at the time of writing, although restricted to over-55s (Hamptons, £200,000). Further afield, Badger's Walk, a modern detached 3 bed property in the heart of Slad, is available through Murrays (£800,000) and The Bungalow at the Knoll in Cranham, a 2 bedroom detached chalet bungalow is offered by Hamptons (£500,000). Two older properties available are Laburnum Cottage, a four bedroom detached house at Jacks Green (Hamptons, £855,000) and The Old Chapel, a former Congregational chapel in Slad, run in recent years as a luxury holiday rental (Hamptons, £1.25 million).





Other properties going under offer include Tall Trees at 8 Randalls Field, Olivas and 2 The New House in Friday Street, while contracts have been exchanged on The Mill House in Pitchcombe, The Old Library in Stroud Road and 1 Brookhouse Mill.



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#### Paintings presented to the Parish Council

At November's Parish Council meeting, councillors were pleased to accept two paintings of particular local interest, generously donated by Pam Bailey, who with her husband John lived for many years in Painswick. John Bailey was one of the key people involved in setting up the Painswick Local History Society some thirty years ago, while Pam's work with many local organisations, particularly the Wednesday Ashwell Group, was recognised when she was chosen as Painswickian of the Year in 2003.

One of the works, painted by John himself, shows an imaginative portrayal of Painswick as it might have been in around 1500 (see the back cover). The other is an original 'cartoon' by the stained glass artist Edward Payne, prepared in advance of his creation of a memorial window in St. Mary's Church. The window commemorates Michael Cawthorn. who died in the Korean War in 1951 and is one of a pair of windows in the church created by Payne, which feature representations of the biblical King David. The final window, showing David with his sling, differs substantially from the proposal in the cartoon, which shows him standing over Goliath with a sword. Both works will hang in the Town Hall.

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#### Why Have Insects **Declined?**

A continuation of last month's article.



The causes are many; habitat loss to development, climate change, light pollution, intensive farming, invasive species and a blizzard of pesticides. Early chemicals used to control pests in agriculture evolved from chemicals developed in the last world war. DDT, organophosphates and paraquat were used in abundance, but were all soon shown to have disasterous consequences to wildlife and humans. They were banned but replaced by new, even more toxic and controversial chemicals e.g. neonicotinoids.

Early use of insecticides seemed to be a perfect solution to pest control. A couple of applications per season would control aphids and mites easily but would also kill lady birds, lace wings, ants and earwigs, their natural predators. Aphids reproduce many times a season, but unfortunately their predators do so only once, so, next year the farmer is forced to spray again, starting a cycle of reliance. Neonicotinoids have been shown to be deadly to bees and hoverflies and even in tiny concentrations, of parts per billion, create deformities in bees which prevent them functioning normally, and stops them pollinating crops. This is already an economic disaster and honey bees are been cultivated to export around the world to try and replace the native bees which have been eradicated.

Use of herbicides, designed to target plants, may seem unlikely to affect insects. However it does. Glyphosate is used in huge quantities globally and now crops have been genetically modified to be glyphosate resistant so that fields may be sprayed and every non crop plant killed. In one instant this removes all the food plants for any insects. It has been shown that glyphosate kills some of the gut bacteria of bees, affecting their health. Bee have been heavily researched, but what of the thousands of other insects we know very little about? Chemical companies have to supply toxicity data, expressed as LD50, the amount of chemical needed to kill 50% of the target organism.

> These are always calculated in laboratory conditions, but no assessment is made of the long term exposure to cocktails of tiny quantities of these compounds as they build up in the environment.

> The most worrying thing to me is that we know very little about most of the insects being affected, the long term effect of these chemicals on wildlife or humans and even knowing some of these chemicals end up in our food, we continue to use them.

#### GB success for Lissey Barnett in Glasgow

Following Lissey becoming British number 1 in Ladies Doubles, she was asked to play for Great Britain in the Billie Jean King Cup (formerly known as the Fed Cup) alongside Heather Watson, Katie Boulter, Harriet Dart and her doubles partner, Olivia Nicholls.

Alicia was delighted to be given the honour to play for her country on home soil in Glasgow. After Great Britain lost in qualifying stages earlier this year they were awarded a wildcard into the finals and deemed 'underdogs' by many, especially as their group consisted of Kazakhstan and Spain.

Their first match was against a strong Kazakhstan team. The first two singles matches were against this year's Wimbledon singles winner, Rybakina and #52 ranked Putintseva and resulted in GB trailing 2-0 going into the doubles where Lissey and Liv went on against the doubles #11, Danilina and Rybakina. The British duo came out with positive, fun energy managing to raise the spirits of the team and getting the crowd on their feet by playing brilliant tennis to close out the match 7-5 6-3.

After playing this match, Lissey was presented with her 'Colours' by Billie Jean herself. She is now the 320th Colour Holder. Colours are the equivalent to 'caps' in other sport and are achieved when a player steps on court to play for GB for the first time.

Going into the last day of group stages, Lissey and Liv had kept the rubbers live by winning their last match but GB would have to win 3-0 against Spain if they wanted to stay in the tournament. Our singles players, Heather and Harriet both put in inspiring performances and played some of their best tennis to give GB a 2-0 lead resulting in the deciding match to be played by Lissey and Liv in the doubles against a pair that had a 12 match winning streak. The match started off tight but with the crowd on their side and still living off the high from Tuesday the pair powered through winning 7-6 6-2, resulting in Britain not dropping a set and reaching their first Semi-Final since 1981.

The semi was against Australia and after two battles in singles we were tied, coming down to the doubles to decide the outcome once again. The Australian pair consisted of Sam Stosur, a multiple grand slam singles and doubles champion and Storm Sanders, also a grand slam champ. There was nothing in the match, with each pair winning a set on a tiebreak. The atmosphere was electric with excitement and nerves as the match entered a deciding 10 point tie break, which the Aussies went on to win 10-6. 
