Painswick on fire

Residents suspect vandalism

As the hot dry spell reached its peak in mid-August, there were at least seven or eight separate fires on Painswick Beacon, causing considerable damage and posing a potential threat to both property and life. The fire service attended at least two incidents and luckily all were contained before they could spread out of control.

All or almost all the fires occurred in the evening or later at night and in a pattern that to many nearby residents suggested deliberate vandalism. The Fire Service has confirmed that at least one

and under water

In another sign of the extreme events that scientists expect to become more frequent as climate change develops, the fires and the hot dry conditions were rapidly followed by torrential rain on the evening of 16th August resulting in significant flooding in various areas of the village. Water ran off the hard dry surfaces, the sheer volume overwhelming the drainage system, sending rivers of water down Painswick's steep streets. Several private houses were badly affected, as were businesses, including the Painswick Stores (Premier) in St. Mary's Street. Prompt action there restricted the damage to some cardboard boxes holding bottles of wine.


We are a Club designed specifically for the over 50's providing interesting talks, excellent

News from St Mary's

I'm something of a newcomer to this glorious area. I moved here from West Sussex about 2 years ago. Now Sussex has its fair share of quirky traditions and legends, but the Painswick 'Puppy Dog Pie' really takes the biscuit. I've read several versions of the folk tale that goes with



it; jilted lovers, unscrupulous publicans, not to mention those very unfortunate dogs. Ewww!

I suspect that the real origins of the pie are lost in history. The Painswick Feast is the patronal festival of our village church, St Mary the Virgin and falls on 25th September this year. In later centuries it is a tradition that would have passed to subsequent landowners, perhaps mill owners as well?

Painswick's past is back Local history programme starts on 20th September

Painswick's past is definitely packed with interest and as from September a selection of fascinating topics from its broad range will be brought back to life via Painswick Local History Society. An unmissable programme of presentations by local speakers has been arranged and everyone is welcome.





John Bellamy, about 1860

Starting the season on Tuesday 20th September, Dr Steven Blake will present the story of John Bellamy, a Gloucestershire travelling showman for many years in the 19th century. In October Martin Bryan will talk about Stroudwater Navigation and why it has been and continues to be so important to the Stroud valleys. Be prepared in November though to be a little shocked when Elisabeth Skinner will tell the story of Stephen Welch, owner of Ebworth Court, involved in the slave trade, wife deserter and all round cad. On a very different note, at the January meeting Stuart Butler will describe the radical history of the Stroud five valleys in the 18th and 19th centuries, and yes, Painswick was involved.

Woodchester Mansion, not so far from Painswick, was certainly an unfinished masterpiece, still greatly admired by those who visit it, and Liz Davenport will tell its story at the February meeting. In March John Putley will reveal all about the history of witches and in particular Gloucestershire witches. John's talks are always a wonderful combination of information and entertainment. 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Scorchio!

What a summer we are having; three months with virtually no rain and record temperatures recorded. Early spring flowers were good but now they have



desiccated and the whole site has been bone dry. Later flowering species such as scabious and knapweeds seem to have flowered and set seed earlier and quicker than usual. There was a beautiful large patch of rare autumn gentians near Jackdaw Quarry, but the thin soils they need have dried out and they have shrivelled and died.

There have been at least seven or eight grass fires so far this year, some of which have been deliberately started and severe enough to call out the fire brigade. Some locals believe the commons were regularly burned. This is not the case. For centuries, regular grazing kept the height of the grass and flowers right down so that in the winter, when plants become dormant, it didn't produce such a dense thatch of dead material which could burn. Burning was often done in the 20th century to get rid of the dense thatch and control scrub. However burning is catastrophic for wildlife; invertebrates, reptiles and small mammals all perish and the resultant ash gives a growth burst for grasses at the expense of the finer forbs* which favour less fertile conditions. We only have something like 2% of our limestone grassland left in the Cotswolds so any fire which destroys any of it is less than ideal. Some invertebrates, such as Rugged Oil Beetles and Chalkhill Blue butterflies rely on very specific parts of it, so, a fire in the wrong place could take out a large proportion of their population. Painswick Beacon has a reasonable number of juniper bushes and was identified as a site worthy of attention, to ensure their long term survival. They are highly flammable and burning seems to be the reason they disappeared from Juniper Hill. We have a number of self generated seedlings on the Beacon which are highly vulnerable to fires.

The drought finally broke with a storm of biblical proportions, approximately 2" of rain fell in about one and a half hours. The ground was so dry most of it flooded straight off. Many paths are now stripped back to bare rock, the fine dry dust washed to the low points to form the sticky mud next winter. Walkers will then avoid this by walking on the adjacent grass, compacting the soil and widening the problem for future years.

There are two events which may be of interest.

Foodbank

Thank you, once again, for the donations received at our August collection. Since April, the Stroud Foobank have issued over 600 parcels per month and seen a 76% increase on referrals between January and July 2022 (compared to the same period in 2021.) Since January 2022, 1577 vouchers for children have been fulfilled – a sobering statistic.


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Celebrate 70 years of National Nature Reserves

2022 marks the 70th Anniversary not only of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, but also of the first National Nature Reserves. To mark the anniversary, Natural England are holding an event over the weekend of the 10th and 11th of September at the Scout Centre in Cranham to celebrate the work that they and their partners do throughout the Cotswold Commons and Beechwoods National Nature Reserve. Starting on Saturday 10th with a moth talk and moth trapping evening (with free hot drinks and cakes!), the event continues on Sunday 11th between 10am and 4pm with stalls and activities and a programme of walks and talks. There will be pastries and pizza provided by Velo Bakery and the fantastic Coffee Lada will be there selling coffee and hot drinks from the boot. There is something for everyone, families and environmentalists and if anyone wants to volunteer for a few hours on the day please contact us and you will receive a free pizza and coffee.

The Cotswold Commons and Beechwoods NNR was established in 1983 and is the largest nature reserve in the Cotswolds. It is largely made up of a chain of ancient beechwoods and limestone grasslands around the upper slopes of the Painswick Valley. Much of the Reserve was a working landscape for centuries with the beechwoods traditionally managed to supply timber, firewood and charcoal, thus creating diverse habitats within the woods. The majority of the grassland was common land grazed by members of the local community, a practice which allowed species-rich wild flower meadows to flourish.

The Reserve is made up of twelve official sites. Six of these (Rough Park, Buckholt Wood, Cranham Common, Sheepscombe Common, Bulls Cross Common and Rudge Hill (Edge) Common) are managed by Natural England, whilst Rough Bank is manged by Butterfly Conservation and five others (Workmans Wood, Saltridge Wood, Lord's and Lady's Wood, Blackstable Wood and Pope's Wood) are managed in partnership with The National Trust. Two other sites, Juniper Hill and Painswick Beacon, whilst not officially part of the NNR are managed in line with the rest of the Reserve, with the Painswick Beacon Conservation Group voluntarily working and grazing the land on the Beacon over the last twelve years with outstanding results.

Jottings

With all the current news of getting the wheat out of Ukraine, it is worth looking at whether we are buying it. Wheat is one of the most important cereal crops grown in the UK and we are about 90% self sufficient. We import almost no wheat from the Ukraine and Russia - most of it, about 15%, comes from Germany and Canada. There are 6 main types of wheat including the Hard Red spring wheat, and the Hard Red winter wheat. Then we have the Soft White, the Hard White wheat and the Durum for making things like pasta.

Good quality British grown milling wheat is ground down and provides flour for bread, cereals, pasta, cakes, biscuits and many other foods. Sometimes a little good quality imported product is added. Over a third of our wheat production is used in the production of animal and bird foods. We use low quality wheat for straw board, paper, adhesives, cosmetics and pharmaceutical products; and export some. Wheat and corn, particularly the straw, are the main products to produce ethanol and additives in gasoline. The straw is of low commercial value but the production of plant-based ethanol is still expensive and at a very early stage. Wheat straw from the old varieties is used for thatching but has to be cut by the old binder then put through the threshing machine to get the long straight stems for thatching.

It's a popular crop because it can be grown in the autumn or the spring. If grown in the autumn, yields are higher, but, of course, sometimes the ground is not ready for crop sowing. There are 8 main diseases of wheat which can damage the crop and reduce yields. With climate change the yield losses could be between 1% and 8%. The lack of water could make this even worse with yield losses of between 4% and 30%. It's not so much the warming as the erratic swings in our weather from drought to flood conditions as well.

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Property Report

Demand for housing in Painswick is still well ahead of supply, although a few new houses have come onto the market this month. Westmorland House in Kingsmead, off Edge Lane (Hamptons, £1.85m), is a pre-war detached house with 5 bedrooms, 3 reception rooms, gardens and great views. Tall Trees in Randalls Field, off Kings Mill Lane (Murrays, £695,000) is a more recent detached 4 bedroom family house with double garage and gardens, and at the bottom of Vicarage Street, Troopers Rest (Hamptons, £400,000) is a refurbished 2 bedroom cottage. Closer in to the centre of the village is 4 White Horse Lane (Murrays, £375,000), a terraced 3 bed family house, with large garden to the rear, leading out onto the Rec. At the same price, Hamptons have 16 Upper Washwell, a 2 bedroom semi-detached property with the option of extending it to a 4 bedroom home.

There are several properties in the surrounding area as well, perhaps most impressively, Tump Farm at Holywell, Edge (Murrays, £2.5m), a 6 bed farmhouse with 20 stable equestrian centre, 3 cottages and 17.5 acres. Kingshead House in Birdlip (Murrays, £1.1m) is also a substantial property that was once a coaching inn and later a restaurant, now a 5 bed family house. On Wick Street, 4 Juniper Cottages (Murrays, £525,000) is a 3 bedroom semi-detached cottage with far-reaching views, while two properties on Lurks Lane in Pitchcombe have gone quickly under offer through Murrays with interest from multiple buyers.

Also going under offer recently through Murrays have been 8 Brookhouse Mill, Lavender Down on Cheltenham Road, Suttons Mill in Cranham and Tunley Cottage in Sheepscombe. The New Drive Field has gone under offer with Hamptons, as has The Hayloft in Birdlip. Contracts have been exchanged on the Old Inn in George Court, Little Mundays in Vicarage Street and Corner Cottage in Bisley Street.



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
