A Year of Transformation at The Painswick Centre

At the recent Annual General Meeting, retiring Chairman John Williamson reflected on the remarkable progress made by the new trustees and dedicated volunteers at the Painswick Centre over the past year. "Well, what a difference a year makes!" he exclaimed, emphasizing the collective achievements of the community.

The chairman began by recalling the Centre's founding in 1906 as a facility managed by and for the people of Painswick. He highlighted how the Centre has long served as a vital community hub, but acknowledged that under previous management, a disconnect had occurred. An increasing number of staff were employed to provide services, leading to rising and unsustainable costs. "This resulted in a loss of ownership and a decline in volunteer participation," he said, noting that fewer people felt inclined to support the Centre in its operations.

The tipping point came last year with the alarming announcement of a partial closure, which triggered a major drop in users and income. "The community was understandably concerned," he noted. However, most users quickly returned once we announced that the Centre was open for business, showcasing the community's resilience and commitment. With renewed focus and a prudent eye on expenditure, the new team of trustees were able to stabilise operations.



The treasurer, Adrian Gyde, provided a detailed financial overview, highlighting the Centre's impressive turnaround since the new trustees took over. Initially facing a projected loss of £68,000, the new trustees worked diligently to reverse that trajectory. By the end of 2023, the loss had been reduced to just £5,572, a significant improvement. The income for the year was recorded at £84,000, while cash reserves grew to nearly £59,000, demonstrating the effectiveness of their cost-cutting measures and community engagement efforts. Adrian emphasised that the Centre is now on a solid financial footing, with continued positive trends into 2024. He reported an income of £68,000 for the first eight months of the year, with a surplus of £16,000 and cash reserves increasing to £77,000. "This robust financial position opens doors for future investments in the Centre's infrastructure and programming," Adrian noted.





Painswick Valley Probus Club

Noel Coward

On Thursday 3rd Oct 2024 the Club met to hear from Peter Gill about Noel Coward whom he characterised as "A playwright whose work is as relevant today as it was 100 years ago". Peter's talk was accompanied by his spirited rendition of several songs and poems written by Coward.

Born in 1899, Coward had little formal schooling but he was a voracious reader. By the age of 7 he had appeared in several amateur productions leading to many child actor appearances over the next few years. He made his professional stage debut in London at the age of 12. Coward proclaimed himself to be "an enormously talented man and there's no point in denying it".

He could, however, joke about his own immodesty: "My sense of my importance to the world is relatively small. On the other hand, my sense of my own importance to myself is tremendous". Famed for his wit and flamboyance, his works as writer, actor, director, film producer, painter, songwriter, cabaret artist and poet, he was called by close friends 'The Master' from the 1920's. He died peacefully in 1973 in Jamaica.

SS Great Britain

On Thursday 17th Oct 2024 we were delighted to receive an amazing account by Ian Caskie, a volunteer tour guide since 2007 from SS Great Britain. Ian's talk was full of detail, while giving his audience a broad appreciation of the scale, opulence and sheer elegance of the steam-powered wrought-iron vessel, and explaining some of the many engineering challenges faced by her designer, Isambard Kingdom Brunel (1806 – 1859). Brunel is considered to be "one of the most ingenious and prolific figures in engineering history". When she was launched in 1843, she was said to be 'the greatest experiment since the creation'.

Yet, extraordinarily, the ship made only 4 luxurious return crossings to New York before running aground due to a navigation error. She was eventually sold for salvage, repaired, and used for much less illustrious roles until becoming beyond economic repair and being scuttled in 1937 at the Falkland Islands. Fortunately, a British naval architect named Dr Ewan Corlett. who was fascinated by the ship, campaigned from 1967 to save the wreck which was returned by barge to Bristol in 1970 for restoration, preservation, and 'relaunch' as a multi-award winning museum.

Now the SS Great Britain Trust is a dedicated educational charity, protecting Brunel's legacy and SS Great Britain and inspiring engineers and entrepreneurs of the future.

Buses struggling through Painswick

I felt obliged to write about buses in Painswick because we have now reached a ridiculous and dangerous situation

My background experience is that on retirement from my fulltime occupation I used my Public Service Vehicle licence to drive for two local bus companies.

Today, I have great sympathy for drivers on the Stroud to Cheltenham route via Painswick as I will explain.

Driving a single deck bus which can be up to 12 metres in length (39.4 feet) from Painswick Church to Abbeydale involves

a sharp left-hand movement from A46 onto

Gloucester Street. Precise care has to be taken to avoid the offside back corner touching the wall of New Hall on the corner of Bisley Street. A second try is certainly not on the agenda!

I understand that recently some parents have complained because the single deck bus has been full on some journeys and the school pupils were left behind. To counter that problem Stagecoach put a double decker bus on the route. That created a new problem! A double decker is 9.5 metres (31 feet) long but it is 4.95 metres or 16 feet 3 inches high. Going towards Abbeymead (Gloucester) involves driving through the Plantation where the trees have proliferated to form a tunnel.

In the old-days the Stroud Bus Company had a decker with the roof removed. A couple of men armed with saws etc would stand on the upper deck and hack down any low branches once or twice a year.

NOT anymore!

The net result is that Stagecoach are now experiencing broken windscreens on the upper deck when going through The Plantation and beyond. That situation cannot continue!

The next problem comes in Gloucester Street in the vicinity of the Christ Church building. Indiscriminate parking has meant the bus trying to squeeze its way up the road to the detriment of a few car wing mirrors. The only solution to that problem is a length of "No Waiting". There is already a parking shortage problem in the village so the Parish Council needs to deal urgently with that issue as well.

I am very pleased to see increased passenger numbers on the route but WE must insist on action as mentioned here otherwise I can see a VERY reduced service by Stagecoach.

A Year of Transformation at The Painswick Centre - cont.

In his address, the Chairman summarised the key achievements since the new trustees took over in May 2023:

- 1. Essential Maintenance: Significant repairs were completed, including replacing the flat roof, updating gutters, jet-washing drains, and installing a new boiler and radiators. Redecorating the Beacon Hall and artists' studios.
- Cottage Renovation: Remedial work on the cottage addressed damp issues, new windows were installed to meet current regulations, the garden was cleared, and the property was decorated throughout, allowing new tenants to move in as of January this year.

In addition to these improvements, several other initiatives that have revitalised the Centre were identified:

- Artists in Residence: The Centre now hosts six artists and craftspeople in newly renovated studios, which are open to visitors throughout the week. "These creative spaces foster artistic expression and community engagement," he said.
- Thriving Market: The Thursday morning market has flourished under the management of volunteer Tom, attracting more visitors and creating a lively atmosphere. "It's a wonderful place for locals to connect and support one another," he noted.
- Popular Café and Events: The Café has also seen a significant increase in foot fall. The Thursday evening takeaway meals have become a staple for both visitors and locals. Additionally, community suppers hosted in the Beacon Hall over the winter months have brought residents together for shared meals and fellowship.
- Engaging Events: Special events such as Tweedy the Clown have successfully engaged various segments of the community. The trustees are eager to hear suggestions for future events and encouraged more volunteers to step forward. "The more we collaborate, the more we can offer to everyone in Painswick, and we are keen to work collaboratively with other groups such as Parish Council, Painswick Community Support, The Church and other groups such as the sports clubs" he said.
- Wick-Flixs This popular film show has returned to the Centre's calendar, drawing in crowds and contributing to the Centre's reputation as a cultural hub in Painswick.

In addition to these community-focused initiatives, the Centre has made strides in governance. The Centre is now registered as an asset of community value and is progressing toward becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). "This modern structure will enhance our operations and governance, making it easier to recruit trustees and manage resources effectively," Treasurer Adrian Gyde acknowledged the complexities of the transition, noting that careful consideration was needed for any changes to the constitution under Charity Commission guidance. "We had hoped to submit these changes sooner, but we believe in taking the time to ensure thoughtful consideration," he emphasised.

The Chairman concluded the meeting by thanking everyone who has contributed time and financial support to these efforts. He urged attendees to consider the "Your Legacy - Our Future" leaflet available at the back of the hall, encouraging them to share it with friends and family. "Next year promises to be exciting as we build on solid financial foundations, transition to a CIO, and foster greater community involvement in the Centre," Williamson said, inviting all to participate in fundraising, volunteering, or organising events. As the Painswick Community Centre moves forward, the enthusiasm and commitment of its community shine brightly, ensuring a vibrant future for this cherished local hub. 




Painswick - Goodwill Evening welcomes one and all to celebrate the season of Goodwill

Dramatically Low Butterfly Numbers.

This year, whilst I've been working on the Beacon and other local commons, it has seemed that butterfly numbers have been very poor. This year's Butterfly Conservation (BC) annual impact report and quarterly magazine both confirm this has indeed been so. BC are a large, well-funded organisation with professional scientists and ecologists collecting national data - much obtained

through citizen science projects such as the National Butterfly Count. Their butterfly records are the longest running invertebrate records in the world. I believe their interpretations to be accurate and make no apology for quoting some of them verbatim.

"We are witnessing staggering biodiversity losses with species disappearing faster than ever in human history. In the UK we have experienced such losses that we are one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world. Report after report using biological data from millions of volunteers highlights that we are just not moving fast enough and that our politicians are not listening or acting; we need to change the conversation. Nature is in crisis."

Last year BC put half of British butterflies on the red endangered list.

"Butterflies and moths are extraordinary indicators of change. We are focusing on more butterflies and moths in recovery, more landscapes improving and more people acting. We have the solutions and we are making a difference."

The cause of the low numbers is the combination of mild winters and exceptionally wet periods. Mild winters are not good for creatures adapted to hibernating or diapausing, they often awaken too early and cannot find flowering plants to feed on and consequently die. Mild wet weather are perfect conditions for fungal and bacterial pathogens to multiply, resulting in higher mortality of immature

insects. Grass growth can be so strong that smaller essential food plants are stifled and harder to find. This means less eggs laid and therefore less adults available to breed the following year. It is easy to see how a struggling species could become locally and then nationally extinct after a succession of these unusual weather events.

On the Beacon we are trying hard to improve the chances of our threatened flora and fauna – preserving it until more of the surrounding countryside becomes potential habitat. We have one of the largest sites in the locality with so much more potential, but we need more volunteers to do it. Why not join us on this fascinating journey?

PMAG Unknown by name or rank

PMAG's second presentation of the season proved both engrossing and moving. Entitled Music Inspired by World War 1 Richard Westwood-Brookes, author and champion of the Elgar Birth Museum, illustrated his talk with relevant compositions by Ralph Vaugan Williams, Ivor Gurney, Herbert Howells (our local men), Australian born Septimus Kelly, John Ireland, Elgar



and most astonishing of all one Birmingham born Mrs Kennedy wife of a professional violinist who as the 20 year old Lilian Elkington commemorated in music the last journey in November 1920 of the body of the Unknown Warrior across the English Channel to his final rest in Westminster Abbey. Entitled Out of the Mist this nine minute masterpiece was performed many times in the 1920s. Herself a gifted pianist she met, formed a duo and then married Mr Arthur Kennedy in 1926 and gradually withdrew from composition and performance.

Predeceasing her husband and daughter in 1969 Kennedy was said to have disposed of her manuscripts, all except three, which by some miracle, were discovered in the 1970s in a Worthing bookshop. The full score of Out of the Mist was one of these and after performance lead to an interview on Woman's Hour where her daughter declared that she had never known that her mother had been a composer. This truly remarkable story about one of the most emblematic pieces of these post war years.

Later in the month PMAG commemorated Gustav Holst's 150th anniversary with a complete DVD Prom performance of The Planets provided by Dennis Morgan alongside some lesser known compositions before 1920 and up to his death in 1934 itself a 90 year anniversary. In the Bleak Midwinter to the tune Cranham was not forgotten.

Gardening Club

On Wednesday, 9th October Paul Green from Greens Leaves Nursery at Newent gave us a knowledgeable, amusing talk on plants - foliage and stems. He spoke of dark leaves with enthusiasm, loving tactile plants. We came away thinking we need to stroke our plant leaves more.

Jottings

Cockchafers are a serious pest to farm and garden crops. The female lays some sixty to eighty eggs in the soil. They hatch into larvae and live underground for at least two years before coming back above the ground as May bugs. We see them flying around then, especially in the evenings.

In the 18th and 19th century people would go out to catch and destroy them. Whilst they are underground they gnaw the roots of garden plants and are a pest of fruit trees. We can see cereal crops disappearing before our eyes over a couple of weeks. Since the decrease of pesticides the number of cockchafers has increased dramatically.

Daddy long legs are the most common of the Crane flies. They are around between April and September. They are attracted to house and street lights. The female lays fifty to a hundred and fifty eggs straight into the soil. These hatch as larvae known as Leatherjackets. They are a serious soil pest which attacks the roots of plants. After a warm summer and autumn, the damage can be evident in fields and your lawns as bare patches. After some six to nine months they emerge as adults and can live for up to twelve months. Starlings love digging them up and they make good bait for using when fishing for trout.

If a farmer can plough a grass field in the autumn and leave it bare, the bird life over winter can have a field day scratching the soil for these bugs.

The Fleece revealed

At the October meeting of the Local History Society members were treated to a fascinating delve into an architectural investigation of The Fleece, Westgate Street, Gloucester. Architectural investigator Rebecca Lane, from Historic England, began with an outline of how such an investigator works. The evidence as to the development of buildings comes in various forms: Exact evidence from contemporary documentation, scientific dating, architectural styles, analysis of the fabric - the structures to be found in roof spaces, windows and fireplaces all can show the development of a building.

The Fleece itself closed in 2002 and is within the Westgate Street heritage zone. The 12th century undercroft (one of three in Gloucester) was for much of the 20th century a bar called 'The Monk's Retreat' building on the idea that it had been a pilgrim inn around the 15th century though in fact there is no documentary evidence of it being an inn until the 17th century. However tree ring analysis shows that much of the roof structures do indeed date to the 15th century.

The undercroft would originally have been a place where a rich merchant may have stored and sold his goods. Above this there would probably have been a mediaeval hall - the main room of the merchants house. The Fleece was acquired by St Peter's Abbey in 1475 and a substantial rebuild took place providing three ranges which are largely intact today. It was leased out by the abbey to merchants and gentlemen who traded themselves or sub-let the property.

In the 19th century it was bought by Samuel Jones who built a brush factory on part of the site and then sold off the inn. In the 20th century it was acquired by the Rich family who enhanced[?] its historic nature by adding a fake gallery to one of the ranges in 17th century style timberwork, a fake timberframe front to the building and a fake fireplace (indicated by the fact that it never had a flue!).

For anyone wishing a more detailed account it can be found on the Historic England website under references Fleece Hotel 19, 19a and 21. Rebecca was an outstanding speaker who held us gripped for the whole talk.

Our next meeting is on 19th November when Kate Peake and Angela Rendell will be taking us on an Aerial tour of Gloucestershire.

Dennis French items in auction

Dennis French was trained using the traditional Cotswold Arts & Crafts making techniques and is part of Painswick's local history. He began his apprenticeship in woodworking and furniture making at only 15 under Owen Scrubey. He has been producing items from his workshop for over fifty years, his work setting a high standard for fellow woodworkers to aspire to.

Today he is known for designing and making turned pieces using traditional lathe-work which are both beautiful and useful. These pieces include burr wood bowls, mirrors and bookends in a variety of timbers such as oak, elm and yew. His minimalistic designs fit into any setting, contemporary or traditional.



Dennis was a familiar face in Painswick for many years selling a variety of his works in his shop. Today, he sells through his website, also offering a bespoke service designing and making individual pieces.

Chorleys' auction of Modern Art & Design on 19th & 20th November includes four pieces of walnut furniture by Dennis French, alongside works by many other well-known makers. The pieces stem from a private collection; each signed and dated, and exemplifies the ideals of the Arts & Crafts tradition with their honest designs and craftsmanship, clearly showing the influence of his early training.





Again, little new in Painswick itself and the market seems a bit becalmed as it awaits the Budget. There is though 1 Canton Acre, a four bedroom semi-detached family home within easy reach of the school, the surgery and the village centre (Murrays, £475,000). Then right in the centre of the village, the Old Fleece apartment, a substantial two storey apartment with open plan vaulted sitting dining room (Murrays, £245,000). There are also two houses over at Longridge. Longridge House is a substantial 5 bed period house on the market for the first time in over 50 years (Hamptons, £1.3 million) and Beechwood Cottage is a 4 bed stone cottage that has been renovated (Hamptons, £860,000). And in Sheepscombe, Brynteg is a detached modern house with 4 bedrooms (Hamptons, £580,000). Back in Painswick, Flat 7 at Hyett Orchard is available at a new price of £150,000, which Hamptons believe may be the best value apartment in this over-55s block for over 20 years. 
