Stroud no longer cut off ... but more work still to be done

Painswick's drivers must by now be amongst some of the most experienced in the country at backing down narrow rural lanes to find a place where two cars can safely pass. The official diversion for a trip from Painswick to Stroud during the 5 week closure that has just ended, went via Barnwood for a distance of just over 19 miles, but it seems a fair bet that most local drivers preferred to take their chances on smaller roads.

The main A46, a crucial link for Painswick, has been closed for a total of eight weeks this year, with temporary traffic lights in place for a further four months - and now back again. The cracking on the southbound lane has to be monitored for at least a couple of weeks, but if no further movement is noted, the plan is to resurface that lane around mid to end September, before finally allowing free flowing traffic with no lights.

The work done during the five week closure was first to locate a culvert, which had become silted up, requiring substantial excavation in the field just above the road. Then new drainage works had to be installed to connect to the culvert and finally, after re-opening, pipe lining had to be completed and fencing finished. Frustratingly for motorists, the road itself remained largely untouched during this work, mostly being used for parking vehicles and machinery.

'Collective action' at the SurgeryPainswick's doctors working to contract

Collective industrial action is under way at Painswick Surgery, with local GPs taking a number of 'technical' actions to put pressure on NHS England, as well as restricting the number of consultations they provide to what they see as a safe limit. The number of 25 patients a day per doctor has been widely mentioned, but Rhys Evans, Senior Partner at Painswick Surgery, points out that this is an average rather than a limit and they will definitely not be simply refusing to see patient 26.

In an article specially written for the Beacon, Dr. Evans explains some of the reasoning, arguing that continuing to operate beyond the capacity of the Surgery in terms of its resources and funding, as they have been doing, affects both safety and quality of care. Painswick Surgery on Strike?

Well actually yes! And no. But hopefully no patient has or will even notice:

WHAT? GP Partners are not employees, so we cannot strike. We have a contract with NHS England and 97% of balloted GP Partners have voted for Collective Industrial Action stating that we will continue to perform every obligation under that contract. So the least militant strike ever! The catch is we will carefully consider whether we can continue to provide services that are not in the contract, and there are many, for which not only are we not paid, but we fund ourselves.

WHY? First and foremost, safety. The headline of a 25 patient a day limit is not plucked out of the air, it is a consensus amongst GPs across Europe as to how many consultations on average a GP can safely perform. We are most definitely NOT planning to bring the shutters down on patient number 26. But we already know that what we are doing now could be unsafe, and we cannot just continue doing it. Three times in the past 4 weeks



I have performed over 70 consultations in a single day. Last year I appeared in the Coroners Court because I missed a single blood test, an experience almost as distressing as knowing that while my error did not contribute to death, it undoubtedly did exacerbate symptoms. Yet it remains common practice that we have no option other than to deal with test results at the end of 11-hour days. Remember these are your bloods, your loved ones.

Secondly, it's about the future of Primary Care. Over the past 5 years NHSE has introduced a great many changes. Primary Care reluctantly decided to engage on the basis that at least it gave us a seat at the table and some influence going forward. That approach has failed, with contracts forced on us against our wishes for the past 3 consecutive years. Things that we know are important, like continuity of care, and the role of Family Doctor, are being undervalued and replaced with acronyms seemingly straight out of the American HealthCare playbook. Quality of care is undoubtedly falling, and GPs are increasingly becoming supervisors instead of doing what we trained for. We wish to protect the things about Primary Care that we believe patients value most.

Thirdly it is about resources. The last time Labour was in power Primary Care received 11% of the NHS budget. Now it is 7%. Primary Care provides 90% of the NHS consultations with 5% of the staff. The number of FTE GPs has fallen by about 1000 in the past 5 years. And yes, it's about money. Last year the surgery funding was increased by 2.1% at a time when inflation had just peaked at 10% and surgery heating bills were rocketing. The Partners had to significantly cut drawings (personal income), despite which the surgery came within £30k of technical bankruptcy.

WHEN? The Collective Action has already started, including at Painswick, and there is no time limit. The actions we do put in place are intended to be permanent. If we do stop offering an unfunded service, it is unlikely we will be able to restart it unless it is included in a future contract agreement.

HOW? There are 10 possible actions we can take, 9 of which to be frank are technical and you will not notice, but NHSE will. However our daily capacity is limited by resources and funding, which are beyond our control. Operating beyond this capacity affects both safety and quality of care. We have not yet decided how to address this but please be assured that whatever we do decide it will be implemented slowly, carefully and safely.

Painswick Surgery Patient Group

If you were running a business your worst scenario would be to have all your work commissioned by your one-and-only customer. That's how it is for GPs running Practices as a private business but subject to every whim of NHS England. The history of this goes right back to the start of the NHS before 1948 and means that NHS England,



only sometimes with negotiation, decides what goes into their contract, and what they are able charge - and therefore what services they won't get paid for. That is the context for Dr Evans' notes above.

As a Patient Group we have to recognise these realities in responding to the current 'Collective Action' by doctors nationally. So for the time

being we are making no comment and monitoring as closely as possible what unfolds. But winter pressures lie ahead and with several staff leaving, each for individual personal reasons, this will exacerbate difficulties in receptionist and administration areas.

Throwing Light on Light

On Thursday 18th July 2024 a talk titled

"Throwing Light on Light" was skilfully presented by Gerald South, who is a retired schoolteacher. His talk was accompanied by impressive visual aids explaining historic



experiments, and how an understanding of light emerged.

In the ancient world it was believed that our eyes emitted particulate light, but this was later refuted by Newton and Maxwell. James Bradley in the early 18th century used the position of the Earth in June and December relative to a star to deduce that light was a stream of particles emitted by the Sun at a speed which was 10210 times the speed of the Earth round the sun. He was only 2% out!

Waves and wave interference were observed by experiments with water. However, Maxwell's Equations supported a theory that light behaved like electromagnetic waves, capable of propagation in a vacuum. Nevertheless, modern science continues to seek evidence of hitherto undetected energy and matter in the universe to better inform our understanding of light.


Property Report

Relatively few of the new properties on the market this month are in Painswick itself, but one worth a look is Woodfield, a 4 bed semi in Vicarage Street (Hamptons, £575,000). Tucked away off the main street, it is believed to be on the market for the first time in over a hundred years. 12 Berry Close (Murrays, £325,000) is more modern, with 3 bedrooms and just two minutes' walk away from The Croft School, while Star Cottage on Hollyhock Lane (Murrays, £435,000) is a 3 bed cottage right in the heart of the village. Or for over-55s, Flat 7 in Hyett Orchard, with Hamptons at £172,000, benefits from a lift and a part time warden, so could suit someone looking to downsize in Painswick.

Further out, Beacon Lodge on Cheltenham Road (Hamptons, £535,000) is a contemporary 3 bedroom bungalow with great views, as Tanglewood on Longridge does (Murrays, £925,000), with four bedrooms. Murrays also have Hillside in Cranham (£1.175m), Applecroft in Pitchcombe (£850,000) and Rudge Cottage in Edge (£1.295m), while Hamptons have Beechwood Cottage on Longridge (£860,000) and Jenkins on Lurks Lane in Pitchcombe (£595,000).


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News from St. Mary's

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
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First Thursday Painswick Exciting autumn season of events




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Painswick's past is back

again

Painswick's past is undeniably fascinating, from the personal to the wider issues and developments. It has been a significant town in the county and its history and that of its surrounding area reflect this.



The Local History Society endeavours to explore as much of this history as possible both in written form (the Chronicles) and in its programme of talks and presentations.

The new season of talks takes off in September when Kirstie Hartsiosis will give a presentation on the Arts and Crafts movement, with which of course Painswick was heavily involved. The 2024-25 programme thereafter spans a good range of topics all intriguing and covering a broad set of interests – an aerial tour of Gloucestershire, a pub history, old paths, local timber castles, St Mary's Church, Tudor and Stuart medicine, and more, plus the annual outing in May.

The presentations are all given by knowledgeable local speakers and the first talk on the Arts and Crafts movement will start at 7.30pm on Tuesday, 17th September at The Croft School. Everyone welcome.

Vicarage Street Residents **Help Needed**

BT Openreach have removed and replaced a telegraph pole in Vicarage Street, outside of Yew Tree House. They are also due to replace the pole at Tabithas, although it is hoped that advance notice can be provided this time.

Telegraph poles used to be able to be fitted with street lights if, it was deemed that no suitable place could be found for a steel post, as was the case for the one by Yew Tree House. However, this is no longer permitted, which leaves a dangerous and very dark bend on Vicarage Street. Despite considerable efforts, no new suitable area of footpath with sufficient depth has been found to install a new column. 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

Andrew Leach has been a key figure in Painswick for many years, his presence here touching so many people's lives always in a positive way. As Associate Priest for the parish he has achieved so much locally but the time to relinquish his role and retire has arrived.

Andrew's road to his role as priest has been one consisting of a range of experiences which have undoubtedly had a very beneficial effect on his ministry. He grew up in Painswick attending Painswick Primary School and then Marling in Stroud. From there he went on to study for a degree in English and German at St David's College, University of Wales. His degree course involved spending a year in Austria teaching English as a foreign language in schools which led on to a post graduate teaching certificate course.


However, Andrew decided that, after all, teaching was not for him and instead he chose banking, specifically the business side, as a career. And so it was for the next 28 years during the course of which he lived and worked in various towns. His final work base was Gloucester which led him back to live in Painswick where he quickly, as he says, felt very settled and very much part of the community. Meanwhile, whilst working in Cirencester, he had met Elaine and they had married in 1990. Daughter Catherine was born in 1995.

From an early age Andrew had been involved with the church. As a child in Painswick, he explains, Canon Heal had been an obvious and good influence. In 2001 he decided to join the local Ministry Team and quickly became increasingly active. He began to feel he might consider the ordained ministry. This involved many training courses and work in the parishes such as taking communion to the sick, visiting, helping with services etc. He was of course also still working full-time and in addition Elaine had been diagnosed with MS. In 2006 Andrew decided the time was right to take early retirement from work especially as he needed, in his words, 'to change my work/life balance because of Elaine's health.'

In 2007 he went to a selection conference and, somewhat to his surprise, was selected for ministry training – the acceptance rate was only about 50%. This led to a 3-year part-time training course, WEMTC, at Gloucester University; he was ordained as deacon in 2010 and finally as priest in 2011. From 2010 for 3 years he was the curate which meant compulsory evening courses, involvement in communion services, weddings, funerals, nursing home visits etc and he was also the Benefice Administrator. It was all part-time, all local and it definitely met all the needs ie fulfilling his pastoral duties and caring for Elaine. Subsequently and ever since, Andrew has been the official Associate Priest in a period which has seen 4 vicars in Painswick. This has meant that there have been times when the role has been vacant either before a new appointment has been made, or sabbaticals or sickness and Andrew has had to take on responsibility for everything.

Although his role is officially part-time the duties do take up a great deal of time. It is generally unpredictable and, as Andrew points out, 'every week is different.' There are now 6 individual parishes each with its own church council, wardens etc, so it is quite complex – diplomacy and good communication skills are vital, and Andrew is excellent on both counts. Despite a very full timetable of parish commitment and family care he has enjoyed other aspects of Painswick life. He was for instance very involved as a performer, treasurer and chairman of the Painswick Players for more than 30 years until its demise in 2016, 'a hobby' in which Elaine was also involved.

Conscientious, hardworking, intelligent, a good listener, excellent coordinator and very diplomatic team leader are just some of the many comments made by his colleagues. Painswick has definitely benefitted from Andrew's wonderful commitment, his compassion, his informed understanding borne of personal experience, all at many levels, and despite the many challenges he has encountered it is heartwarming to hear him say 'I wouldn't have missed any of it.' Andrew's last duty will be at the Clypping on Sunday, 22nd September.

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
Exploring Painswick

Jottings - on lvy

Love or hate it, ivy grows well in shade, along the ground and up trees, hanging on with adhesive stem roots. The leaves and berries are slightly toxic and the foliage can cause contact dermatitis. There is evidence that it can kill breast cancer cells. Pollen can irritate your throat and



lungs so it is best to wear a mask when clearing ivy.

The mature plant produces flowers which appear in clusters and are pollinated by bees and wasps. Because ivy flowers late in the year, from September to October, it is an important food source for insects when there is little else with nectar or pollen. Birds feed on the fruit which forms between November and January. The leaves are eaten by the caterpillars of several moth species, such as the angle shade, lesser broad-bordered yellow underwing, swallow-tailed moth and willow beauty. The small dusty wave feeds exclusively on ivy.

Wild birds and small mammals shelter and nest in ivy, protected by the woody tangle formed. In a cold winter, a large number of wrens can sometimes be found huddled in ivy to keep warm. Some people say ivy strangles the trees being so thick around it, but it does not compete for nutrition from the soil and does not harm the trees. It is not a parasite though if it smothers the crown, the tree leaves are shaded from the sun and cannot photosynthesise. Older trees which may be weakened and decaying may be brought down in a storm by the weight of a lot of ivy being blown around.


Painswick Library Book Club

Local Publisher reprints Cotswold book

Designed and published by Nick Darien-Jones of Painswick-based Darien-Jones Publishing, the book has been widely recognised as the best ever book on the Cotswolds, being more about ambient landscape and culture rather than just the usual pretty villages. 

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

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
