

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - from the meeting held on Wednesday 15th October. reported by David Allott

Parish Council Meeting,

Telephone Kiosk:

The meeting received an illustrated report from The Kiosk Working Party. This contained several interesting suggestions and the names of some potential sponsors and contributors. These included:

- Some stained-glass panels, replacing some of the existing glass, depicting local scene(s).
- A Cotswold Way map highlighting Painswick's location.
- An audio history of Painswick automatically played when the door is opened.
- Opportunities to accept local sponsorship, engage with local societies and trusts, and to involve local creatives.

These proposals were for initial approval. Next will be further discussion and obtaining budget costings for all proposed works as well as any consents needed.

Parish Flood Wardens:

The meeting resolved to recruit and appoint several Flood Wardens. Their task will be to monitor their given areas and to raise the alarm of potential flood risks as appropriate.

District Council

Councillor Gary Luff's report informed us that:

Empty Homes Strategy:

The Council approved a five-year strategy to 2030 to bring more empty homes into use, initially focussing on long-term empty homes, particularly those that are the subject of complaints or other concerns. Currently 986 properties are registered as empty for the purposes of Council Tax. The Private Sector Housing Team is expected to need extra resource to deliver

New Council Housing:

The Council is currently acquiring 30 "affordable" homes from developers in Kingswood, Cam and Horsley through Section 106 agreements. A planning application for a further 17 units in Dursley is expected in November

Decarbonisation and energy efficiency of council housing.

Over recent years, the Council has secured over £9 million in Government grant funding to improve the energy efficiency of council homes, along with additional council investment. Works include insulation, windows, 'renewable' heating and solar panels. Data from 160 homes showed an average saving of £600 on fuels per house per year and a total annual saving of 170 tonnes of carbon for the group. A further 850 homes have been added to the programmes. This work area was recognised last year when SDC won an award for the Best Social Housing Led Retrafit Programme.

Subsidy for bulky waste collections:

Following a successful trial in Nailsworth, it was agreed to offer subsidised collection across the District to all who are in receipt of Housing Benefit and Council Tax Support.

Customer Contact:

Last year there were over 9,700 visits to Ebley Mill, and 165,00 calls to the main SDC telephone number, the vast majority answered within one minute. Further developments are proposed including a new facility from next summer allowing customers to request a callback instead of waiting on the line. Emails should be responded to as soon as possible and within 10 working days. Most emails to the recycling mailbox have been answered on the same day.

County Council

Councillor Gary Luff's report informed us that:

Childcare:

GCC has helped to create over 1,500 new childcare places since April 2024, including 526 Early Years places and 1,128 Wraparound childcare places.

Grassroots:

GCC is set to invest £1.1 million to create a new Grassroots Neighbourhood Fund that will allow each county councillor to invest up to £20,000 in local grass roots projects

Community Funding:

Community groups across Gloucestershire are invited to apply for a share of £400,000 through the county councils Thriving Communities Grant programme.

Local Government Reorganisation:

Update. Proposals for LGR are continuing to be considered by each of the seven councils before sending proposals to government this month. A public consultation is expected early in 2026 before a likely decision by mid-2026. The three options are:

- A. A single unitary council for the whole county
- B. Two unitary councils split, East (Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Cotswold) and West (Gloucester, Forest of Dean and Stroud).
- C. A "Greater Gloucester" unitary council, plus a unitary council for the remainder of the county.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 19th November.





Planning Meeting

Matters requiring a decision:

- a. S.25/1431/HHOLD Shetlands, Far End, Sheepscombe (REVISED PLANS) Demolition of outbuilding. Erection of two storey extension with single storey glazed link, orangery and garden pergola. The Committee agreed to object to this application and agreed that the original objections and reasons remain extant. The Committee further requested that this application be considered by Stroud District Council's Development Control Committee, should the Planning Officer be minded to approve the application.
- b. S.25/1717/FUL Agricultural Building At Hammonds Farm Wick Street Replacement of asbestos roof and side cladding with profile metal roof and steel purlins. Repair/replacement of concrete trusses and columns, and installation of solar panels. The Committee agreed to support this application.
- c. S.25/1744/FUL The Byre, The Park Engineering operation to create a new pond. The Committee agreed to support this application subject to there being a net biodiversity gain.
- d. S.25/1886/HHOLD Edge Cottage, Edge Road Erection of a two storey side extension and a single storey front extension. The Committee agreed to object to this application as it felt that the proposed single storey extension is over dominant and the proposed materials are not in keeping with the current character of the cottage.
- e. S.25/1946/HHOLD Kimsbury Villa, Cheltenham Road Erection of a single storey rear extension. The Committee agreed to support this application.
- f. S.25/1835/TCA Fieldcroft, Sheepscombe Reduce the height of Maple Tree by up to 7m. The Committee agreed to support this application.
- g. S.25/1870/TCA The Old Bakery, 3 Cheltenham Road Prunus Pissardii (Cherry plum) - 1m reduction. The Committee agreed to support this application. Date of the next Planning Committee meeting – Wednesday 5th November

Jottings

Over the last month or so you may have seen large tractors running around the roads, with a machine hung on the front and a bigger one on the back. The machine on the front is for disturbing the soil. The one on the back is the drill with an attachment for covering the seed up. The farmers are planting the autumn planted cereals, and patching up the spaces with grass and herbal mixtures where the crops have failed due to the dry weather we had earlier in the year.

Farmers are being encouraged to grow more seed mixtures for wild flowers/birds/hay and grazing. We need to consider the type of soil we have, acid or alkaline; and weather predictions for our area for the next growing season. Are we farming on clay or sandy soil and will it be damp or dry. This will determine whether we plant short or long term seed mixtures.

With grass / herb mixtures for long term, it is best to go for a mixture which contains some twenty-eight different seed species and that may cost £500 per acre for the seed alone. The amount of seed of each variety is done on a percentage scale: this is one of the most expensive ones! Or you go for a less expensive one with less flower species and doesn't include herbs.

You can also get mixtures for field margins that produce maximum pollen and nectar. And, or, seed mixtures to provide maximum seeds for birds. But with all of these seed mixes, you need to plant at the right time of year to get the best crops.

Dog Fouling- Hambutts Field,

..adjacent to Edge Road, has long been a favourite place for dog walkers and the public in general. Unfortunately there has been an increase in dog fouling recently, making it both unsightly to our visitors on the Cotswold way, and of course a health hazard. The latter has now taken on even greater significance with the arrival of cattle in the adjoining fields.



This year, and hopefully in the future, Hambutts Field will be a source of fodder (hay and silage) for the cows, and any remnants of dog waste hidden in the grass can cause them serious harm. Accidentally ingesting the faeces can cause miscarriages and neurological problems in calves and is a leading cause of bovine abortions in the UK.

Dog Fouling - Churchyard

Users of Painswick's beautiful churchyard may have seen the new stencilled notices on the paths. It is sad to have to say it, but this is because dog fouling in the churchyard has plumbed new depths.

The Leyhill working party that used to cut the churchyard grass said that of all the public spaces in which they worked, Painswick churchyard was the worst for dog fouling. The Parish Council have since taken over cutting the churchyard grass and their operatives have had a similar experiences, with dog muck sticking



to the machinery and the strimmer splattering it over the operator. This year, for the first time, Tree Maintenance Ltd who cut the yew trees have complained about dog excrement contaminating the tarpaulins they use to collect the cuttings.

Dog walkers are reminded to keep all dogs on a lead when in the churchyard and to clear up after their dog. Dog waste bins are available for the bags. There are sizeable fines, up to £1,000, for those who do not clear away their dog's fouling – don't be the one to "fall foul" of these.

Public Health

The group was pleased to welcome Claire Proctor from the GCC Public Health and Communities Hub who helped us understand more about the revised public health national agencies and local provision. The Public Health team based at GCC has a statutory duty to improve and protect the health of their local population. The team are responsible for preventing ill health for all ages focusing on the whole population rather than individuals, providing a number of services in the County.

Patient Survey discussion

The NHS conducts a survey of patients' views of their Practice each year and the results are on the Web for Painswick here: http://bit.ly/48BD985. Discussing them we concluded that on all the critical aspects our Practice performs very well given the current circumstances under which they have to operate. Many will criticise the lower figures for ease of contact – via phone or website (eConsult) but we noted that the survey was undertaken early this year while the Practice administration was short-staffed. In general the group felt that congratulations were in order and commended the hard work that had achieved such good results.

Joint Gloucs Patient Groups meeting report

A range of surveys and updates are available from NHS Gloucs to which you are invited to respond as you wish – these are listed in the extended email edition of this bulletin and in our meeting minutes on the website and waiting room noticeboard.

Practice Manager report

Happily, the Practice is currently fully staffed with the latest admin recruit, Debbie, now 2 months in and settled in. Dr Albright is on maternity leave and being covered by multiple locums – Drs Lee, Scott and Bogarva.

Digital – digital – digital!

We were also delighted to discover that our humble Painswick Centre is hosting a high level two day conference on digital innovation in health on the 23/24th October (after this bulletin goes to press) which we will attend.

Our Practice has been ahead of the game for some time by using the eConsult digital triage system, however the 1st October deadline to meet the new demands (see below) created some complications which the Practice is having to resolve.

Having shown you in our July news how eConsult provides information for your consultations we hope you are reassured by the way the digital procedure feeds information into your consultation with a GP. Furthermore, the Practice staff are positive that the efficiencies resulting from this system have literally kept the Practice running in the face of ever-increasing demand and ever-reducing funds.

More on GP contract changes

You may have seen posters in the Surgery about the recent contract changes and funding levels from the government. The former makes three core requirements:

- 1 Online consultation tools must be switched on for the duration of core hours (for us: eConsult –and it is)
- 2 The Practice website must include 'You and Your General Practice' which describes what practices and patients can expect of each other
- 3 Developments in connecting patient records to national systems including Pharmacists.

Doctors nationally are unhappy about the way these requirements have been implemented and are actively campaigning for better funding and more careful implementation of these innovations. More here: http://bit.ly/4nTuzWY

Discovering MacDonald Gill: Architect, Artist and Mapmaker.

On 9th October Caroline Walker, great niece of the brothers MacDonald and his more (in)famous sibling Eric Gill, was welcomed to the Painswick Centre.



Caroline opened by noting that Painswick is adorned with examples of Eric Gill's work but her purpose was to explore the life of his lesser-known brother MacDonald Gill.

He leapt to fame following a commission for a pictorial map of the London Underground Railway which first graced stations in 1914. Six further 'Wonder' maps followed and Gill became the pre-eminent mapmaker of his time. Joining the Imperial War Graves Commission in 1918 he designed the lettering and the regimental badges for all British military headstones. The designs are still in use today.

Between the Wars his poster designs and painted maps were seen across the country and his murals were installed on the great liners Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary. Successful book illustration followed but his fame grew on his grand projects of murals for churches and the Great Exhibitions. Designs for logos of great organisations including the GPO, The Royal Family and Rolls Royce became iconic and an enduring legacy to his art. The Painswick audience appreciated this fascinating story told with wit and enthusiasm by Caroline.

Secret Stroud

A packed audience at the Local History Society meeting on 21st October heard David Elder talk about 'Secret Stroud', covering a selection of its quirkier aspects. For once traditional aspects of the town's history, such as its role in the wool industry or its canals and railways got hardly a mention.



Instead David talked of what was said to be the last pistol duel to be fought in England, held in a field in Stroud in 1807 (although a field, which at the time was strictly part of Painswick) and of Edwin Budding, who invented not only the lawnmower, but also the adjustable spanner and a type of revolver. Famous visitors to the town were highlighted, from John Wesley to the Beatles, as was its tradition of protest, from the founding of Extinction Rebellion to the wonderful Eileen Halliday who stood up against Sainsburys when they wanted to demolish her house for their car park. David's book 'Secret Stroud' is available in local bookshops or online.

Next month the new edition of the Painswick Chronicle will be available and Simon Draper will talk about Medieval Manors in the Cotswolds under the title 'Lordship in the Landscape' – Tuesday 18th November at The Croft School at 7.30pm.

Richard Westwood-Brookes, distinguished visitor, told us tales of Peter Warlock and Earnest Moeran who scan-

dalised Kent with alcohol induced exploits on two wheels. Warlock (nee Heseltine), alma mater Eton and Royal College of Music, became a musical journalist and supporter of Frederick Delius for whose fame he and Thomas Beecham share responsibility. However, as Warlock he composed glorious music. Songs predominated but also Tudor inspired music such as Capriole Suite and carols Adam Lay Bounden and Bethlehem Down.

By now living in Ireland, he continued to compose symphonies and concerti (which Richard urged everyone to explore) dying in 1950 of a cerebral haemorrhage resulting from his war injury.

There was a link to Jenny Buckland's excellent well researched presentation "From England's Green and Pleasant Land". Moeran's musical career had begun under the tutelage of one Robert Sterndale Bennett grandson of Sir William Sterndale Bennett whose 1838 Sextet she played. Sir William, a pre-eminent composer from the Victorian era now remerging, was a prolific composer of symphonies, concerti and chamber music. Ranging from Purcell and Handel through to George Lloyd via Alice Smith (wonderful piece for clarinet and orchestra) and Arthur Bliss she managed to include music by Gloucester's own Parry, Holst and Gurney.





What we learnt about Maria!

Now we are wiser! When Paul Murphy came to talk at the September meeting of Yew Trees WI he chose four women to illustrate the truth behind the story of The von Trapp family. Agathe Whitehead, granddaughter of Robert Whitehead the



inventor of the torpedo, an heiress and aristocrat born in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, was the first. In 1912 she married George von Trapp a captain in the Austrian navy who became a hero for commanding submarines during the First World War. The couple had 7 children and thanks to Agathe's wealth lived a happy comfortable life until 1922 when she sadly died from scarlet fever.

At no surprise to the audience Paul then introduced Maria Kutschera as woman number 2! Maria was a nun at the Benedictine Abbey in Salzburg, who was sent to tutor the eldest of the von Trapp children. Maria had quite a tempestuous young life and was reluctant to marry Georg von Trapp but followed what she believed to be "The Will of God". The result: a happy marriage and 3 more children. The family formed a singing group and were placed first in the 1936 Salzburg Music Festival. In June 1938 with their singing director, Reverend Franz Wasner, they left Austria by train for Italy then on to London and New York. There, thanks to Franz Wasner's connections, they were able to settle.

The last two women to feature were the actors Mary Martin and Julie Andrews. Mary brought the fictional "Maria" to life in the Broadway Musical 'The Sound of Music' and Julie in the 1965 film, loved by so many. Although Paul's audience were sad to learn that the von Trapps did not escape Austria singing and dancing, while carrying heavy cases across the mountains, they were intrigued to learn the real story.

On Tuesday 25th November at 7.30pm in The Church Rooms, Pat Furley will entertain us with a magic lantern show entitled "The History of the Titanic". Ladies do come and join us.

MOD War Detectives and Newport Medieval ship.



To mark Remembrance Day this year, our lecture on Wednesday 5th November at 2.30pm in the Painswick Centre

will be given by Alexia Clark a member of the MOD War Detectives team. This team, based in Gloucester, are tasked with identifying missing British Service Personnel from the two World Wars and the Korean War. With over 582,000 men still missing this is no small task. The team conducts research and genealogy and facilitates DNA testing as part of their investigative work before rededicating graves or ensuring a dignified burial. Come along to hear more about their painstaking and important work.

In a different vein, this is followed on Tuesday 18th November by a talk in Box Village Hall (2.30pm) about the 'Newport Ship'. Built in 1457, this merchant vessel sailed until 1468 when, during repairs, it tipped over, not to be recovered until it was found by accident in 2002. The ship is earlier than the Mary Rose, had three masts and measured over 30 meters. Come and hear the amazing story of the painstaking excavation and conservation of the ship, told by the lead volunteer guide Jeff Gosvenor.

Duncan Coombs returned to talk to us, on Wednesday, 8th October. He is an enthusiastic lecturer, having spent over thirty years sharing his passion with plants at the local Pershore College. This time the subject was "Spring Bulbs". We should be planting daffodils early to allow strong roots to grow before the frost.

But also plant crocuses and hyacinths. Tulips are best left until November to reduce the risk of "tulip fire" fungal disease. What else can we be adding to our spring colour collection? Suggestions included winter aconites which are very good for the bees. Cyclamen prefer damp acid soil as do Leucojums, e.g. "Summer Snowflake". Camasias like damper

soil and are easy to grow.

For our next, November, Meeting, Emily and Izzy from Highfield Nursery are coming to talk about houseplants. The original Highfield Nursery site in Whitminster celebrated its hundredth birthday in 2020 and still produces vegetables, seedlings and other seasonal plants for their garden centre: Now it is the leading Independent, family run Garden centre in Gloucestershire with an excellent restaurant. So what recommendations can they offer? And perhaps presents to give or receive for Christmas. Having plants in our homes is therapeutic and especially so during the winter in poor weather and we can't get outside. Come and find out on Wednesday, 12th November at the Painswick Town Hall. Go Wild in Wick Street

If you want the best, the freshest, the most organic produce available, a farm shop is usually the number one option. It is therefore good to report that Painswick residents now have that option within striking distance, that is, just up the road. WILD - Wick Street Farm Shop and Café is now fully open on a permanent basis.

Set in what was formerly an agricultural barn, one of amazing architectural beauty, WILD has progressed steadily from its simple beginnings in 2017 to its present day wide ranging offer. Ellie Tremlin has enjoyed a farming background locally all her life and in 2017 she began to develop the idea of a shop and café, albeit initially on a small scale as a one-off Christmas shop. Later, in the summer, she served teas and coffees from a horsebox at the side of the road by the family farm. From then on, as Ellie explains, 'it has grown organically'.

The range of produce and goods on sale in the shop is certainly impressive and furthermore it is all supplied and made by local

farmers and food producers. Ellie feels passionately that this is important for so many reasons. The food items are 100% fresh and definitely seasonal, so vary accordingly, which of course also means good for the environment with little or no transport involved. Meat is sourced from three local farms, bread from Hobbs House Bakery and beers from Stroud Brewery. There are locally made jams and preserves, a deli counter, Tracklement's sauces, Yoke House ice cream, fruit, vegetables and flowers from local farms and Golden Sheep Coffee ground on the estate at Wick Street.

And that isn't all! The shop has a lovely selection of other goods on sale. Arts and crafts items locally made are particularly noticeable including work by our own renowned, clever and highly skilled artist, Anthony Lewis Churchill. Jemima, brand name JimJam, a 16 year old artist from Painswick, will shortly be displaying some of her ceramics and linens in the shop. There are cards, books, sheepskins, a range of gift items and so much more.





From about mid-November the range of goods will be extended to become in effect a Christmas shop with decorations, gifts, Christmas food, crackers, wreaths etc and there will also be Christmas trees on sale. Furthermore, on Saturday, 23rd November and Saturday 7th December the barn will open as a full Christmas market with a range of stalls selling different foods and goods. Christmas shopping in a perfect rustic setting.

Adjacent to the shop is the lovely café. Open from 10.00am to 5.00pm, food is served until 3.00pm. Simple and basic it is all cooked and baked on the premises and served in the delightful café section of the barn. A lovely wood-burning stove makes it cosy in the winter and in the summer there is a delightful seating area outside.

Ellie is a young woman determined to present us with a healthy, interesting and environmentally aware shopping experience. With an emphasis on the local aspect, she points out it is not about being competitive with other local shops as in fact they are working together, mutually supportive and cooperative. WILD - the shop and the café – is certainly special. Our local farm shop, it is definitely worth a visit.



Probus club report



On Thursday 2nd October Arthur Ball, who had previously addressed the club about the Galapagos Islands, gave a very entertaining talk on "Panama, A Wildlife

Adventure ", recounting a recent visit to the country (40% of which is covered in dense rainforest) where he stayed in Canopy Tower - a former US radar tower now converted to an "eco lodge".

After the howler monkeys had sounded a noisy wake-up call at 5.30 each morning, the days and evenings were spent spotting some of the more than 1,000 species of birds including scarlet caciques, tanagers, honeycreepers, hawk eagles, manakins and black-bellied whistling ducks. The many mammals included sloths, ninebanded armadillos, agoutis, kinkajous, woolly opossums and capybaras. Green iguanas were everywhere among the trees but a favourite reptile was the Jesus lizard, so called from its ability to dash across water without sinking.

On Thursday 16th October our fellow member Colonel Tony Singer gave an informative and amusing talk about the Royal Yacht Squadron, of which he has been a member since 1986 and is now its Senior Race Officer. This August institution in West Cowes was founded in 1815 as the Royal Yacht Club, becoming the "Squadron" in 1833 at the instigation of King William IV. The aristocratic founder members employed crews to do the actual business of sailing.

The Squadron was at the forefront of design and development (encouraged by the first Vice Commodore the Earl of Belfast) which led to greatly increased speeds for aside from its royal patronage (stretching from the Prince Regent to Prince Philip and now the Princess Royal) the membership has included a rich and distinguished cast, and not a few eccentrics. Sir Claud Champion de Crespigny, in his eighties, liked to bathe from the RYS steps and was the subject of a Bateman cartoon.

Property Report

There are several million pound plus houses newly for sale in Painswick, but it's some of the lower priced cottages that seem to have attracted most interest. Little Jasmine Cottage off Edge Lane (Murrays, £195,000) went under offer on its first viewing, while Ivy Cottage in Pitchcombe (Murrays, £495,000) went viral on social media with over 200,000 views and was also quickly under offer. At the time of writing the two bedroom Fourways Cottage on St. Mary's Street (Hamptons, £340,000) is still available, as is Shoestring Cottage on Tibbiwell (Murrays, £745,000) with 4 bedrooms and 3 reception rooms. For a more modern 4 bedroom semi-detached family house, Murrays have 38 Ashwell at £375,000, but 12 Berry Close, which Hamptons were offering at £265,000, has gone under offer.

None of those houses though can offer 5/6 bedrooms, 5.5 acres of land and an outdoor pool, which is what you would get for your money with Park House at The Park (Murrays, £1.65 million). And probably none can match the dramatic conversion of the Old Church at Jacks Green (Hamptons, £725,000) into a modern 3 bedroom house, or the stable and pony paddock that comes with Grey Gables (Murrays, £1.25 million) on Cheltenham Road, up near the Royal William.

High Warren (Murrays, £1.225 million), set in an elevated position at The Highlands, has 5 bedrooms, including the possibility of a self-contained annexe. Facing it across the valley at Longridge, Van Barr (Hamptons, 900,000) also has 5 bedrooms and may have scope for extension or remodelling.

At Richmond Village, Independent Living Apartment 4 is available at £450,000 and they also have an Assisted Living 'Experience Apartment' available for 'try before you buy'. See the Richmond website for more details.

As well as those mentioned above, Murrays report that Lantern Cottage on Tibbiwell, The Malt House on Vicarage Street, Tragarth at Cranham and Highcroft on Cheltenham Road have gone under offer, while Greenbanks in Blakewell Mead, Hill View on Beacon Close, Meads in Pitchcombe, Tanglewood on Longridge and Badgers Walk in Slad have all exchanged and/or completed. Through Hamptons, 9 Hyett Close, 25 Churchill Way, Highclouds at Queens Mead, Beacon View at Longridge and Pound Cottage at Cranham have all gone under offer, while Hale Lea on Kings Mill Lane and Juniper House at The Highlands have completed.

Painswick Beacon Conservation Group have been awarded a plaque and certificate for our long-term efforts towards improving the overall quality of the Beacon. Richard Aspinall and I received the award from Madeline Bunting, president of the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE). We were one of seven organisations to be recognised. Projects ranged from a small group of affordable housing, a sensory park, an outdoor play area and fitness equipment, a regenerative farming project, a community art space in an old chapel and the restoration of an old mill for community use.



The event took place at Elmore Court in the very impressive Gillyflower venue. This building has very green credentials being built from materials obtained from the estate and heated by a bio boiler. It received an award from CPRE a few years ago.

CPRE is a charity that has worked tirelessly to protect what makes the English countryside so unique. It celebrates its centenary next year and will be planning plenty of high-profile events.
